- Provide "peer to peer" support to help families access needed information and resources






COMMUNICATION BASICS

LISTEN TWICE AS MUCH AS YOU TALK



Elements of Active Listening


- Be attentive
- Be nonjudgemental
- Paraphrase (don't overdo it!)
- Be aware of body language





"You can stop saying 'uh-huh'! I stopped talking to you an hour ago!"





• Go to workshops & call KY-SPIN!




• Volunteer at school




Set the Tone of the Meeting

- Bring a picture of the child
- Ask the each team member to share something positive about the child
- Bring a treat!!

Work toward resolving differences of opinion





Close Ended Questions

Example: Did my son do well today?

This is helpful if you just need a simple one word response such as yes or no





Asking Questions

• Ask questions in a way you would like them answered

What did my son do well today?

The answer requires an explanation



Open Ended Questions

Example: What did my son do well today?

This is the type of question to ask if you need a detailed response



Differences of Opinion Use LUCK:

Listen to and restate the other person's opinion.

Use a respectful tone.

Compromise or change your opinion if necessary.

Know and state the reasons for your opinions.




Remember:
