

What is the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)?



The IDEA applies to children from ages 3 to 21

Through the IDEA, students are assured a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)



Kentucky Administrative Regulations for Special Education Programs (707 KAR)

What is Special Education?

Special education is *instruction* that is specially designed to meet the needs of children with disabilities.

Public schools are charged with providing special education and related services to eligible students with disabilities at no cost to their parents.

The goal of special education is to make sure that each eligible student with a disability is provided equitable access to public education and provided with instruction, supports and services that help them achieve at high levels.



Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) (707 KAR 1:290)

FAPE is highly individualized and is determined by the students Individualized Education Program (IEP) team.

Local school districts are responsible for providing FAPE to students with disabilities.

Instruction must be specially designed to meet the specific needs of a child that result from their disability.

Each student's Admissions and Release Committee (ARC) must make specific decisions regarding the services to be provided.



The ARC

(707 KAR 1:320, Section 3)





In Kentucky, the "IEP team" is called the Admissions and Release Committee (ARC).



The ARC works together to develop an individualized and high-quality IEP.



The ARC includes several members, *all* with valuable expertise in how the student learns best.

What is an IEP? (707 KAR 1:320)



The Individualized Education Program (IEP) contains information about the child and the educational program designed to meet their unique needs.

The IEP sets out a plan for growth and progress in the academic, functional, social and emotional areas that are impacted by their disability.

IEPs are documentation of the decisions made by the ARC.

Importance of Partnership



Partnership among ARC members is an essential element of a well-developed IEP.



Both family and school- based members play a critical role in providing valuable expertise that informs decisions for the student.



The most successful partnerships have meaningful, two-way communication and respect.



Partnership extends beyond the annual ARC meeting.

Meaningful, twoway communication: the ARC and beyond





Effective Communication Tips



Ask questions

Be an active listener

Value and respect other members

Express honesty

Allow both discussion and disagreement

Respect cultural differences

Focus on strengths

Be complementary

Be aware of verbal and non-verbal cues
