Showing Our Disability Pride: Together Like Lions

Did you know a group of lions is called a pride? Lions in a pride may live in different places or spend time alone, but they always come back together to hunt, rest, or share food. Even when they are apart, they are still a team. Disability pride is a lot like that. People with disabilities may all be different—some people use wheelchairs, some are deaf or blind, and some have invisible disabilities—but they are all part of the same group.

During the month of July, we celebrate Disability Pride Month. It's a time to be proud of who you are and the things you've overcome. Just like lions, we are stronger when we support each other. Whether you have a disability or care about someone who does, this is the time to show your pride. Stand tall, be kind, and help others feel proud too!

Question: Hi, I'm a teenager with a disability and I want to feel more connected during Disability Pride Month. How can I get involved and show my pride here in Kentucky? *Student - age 14*

Answer: That's a great question, and we're proud of you for wanting to be part of the celebration! Disability Pride Month is a time to celebrate who we are, share our stories, and stand together as a community.

In Kentucky, you can join local events through organizations like KY-SPIN, The Center for Accessible Living, or even your local library or disability support groups. They often host gatherings, art shows, parades, or virtual events where you can meet others and proudly share your experiences.

You can also show your pride by wearing disability pride colors, posting on social media with hashtags like #DisabilityPride and #PrideLikeLions, or even organizing a small event with friends or classmates. Sharing your story or artwork is a powerful way to raise awareness and feel more connected. Remember, Disability Pride isn't about being the same—it's about being proud of your differences and knowing you belong.



Each month, we will share an advocacy success story or answer a question about life, school, and friends sent to us by students around the state. Your stories and questions are important, so don't wait, be a part of the changes in Kentucky today.

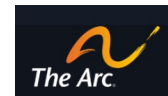

Adding goals to your IEP that focus on self-advocacy will increase your understanding of your disability and give you the skills to speak up for what you need.

Taking Pride in Who You Are Starts with Your IEP!

Knowing how to speak up for yourself is the first step in showing pride in who you are. One great way to start is by adding self-advocacy goals to your IEP (Individualized Education Program). These goals can help you practice asking for what you need, making choices, and learning more about your strengths. The more you advocate for yourself, the more confident and independent you become!

Discuss with your **ARC (Admissions and Release Committee)** the possibility of incorporating functional goals into your IEP to help you build and maintain skills you need for future success. KY-SPIN offers various examples of goals available on our [website](#) that you might find helpful.
