
Suicide Awareness Month

Using Manipulatives to Support Students with Disabilities Series Video Series

This video series is designed to support teachers and families of students with disabilities in making math more accessible and engaging using math manipulatives. Each video is under seven minutes long and demonstrates how to use both standard and do-it-yourself (DIY) manipulatives to teach essential math concepts.

- <u>Video 1 How to Teach Math Using Base Ten Blocks</u> showcases effective strategies for using base ten blocks to teach foundational math concepts such as place value, addition, subtraction, and regrouping.
- <u>Video 2 How to Teach Math Using Counters</u> demonstrates how counters can be used to teach counting, addition, subtraction, and number sense through tactile and visual engagement.
- <u>Video 3 How to Teach Math Using Fraction Manipulatives</u> demonstrates how manipulatives can be used to visualize part-whole relationships, compare fractions, and understand equivalency.
- <u>Video 4 How to Teach Math Using Number Lines</u> showcases how number lines can be used to teach math concepts such as counting, addition, subtraction, skip counting, and understanding negative numbers.
- <u>Video 5 How to Teach Math Using Pattern Blocks</u> demonstrates how pattern blocks can be used to teach key math concepts such as shapes, symmetry, fractions, and spatial reasoning.

Early Intervention in Childcare Settings

Early Intervention Visits in Childcare Settings: What to Expect A Guide for Teachers

Early Intervention providers use a coaching approach to support you and the children in your care. They partner with you during everyday classroom routines and activities to help babies and toddlers with disabilities or delays actively participate and learn.

When the provider arrives, they will join in your regular classroom routine. They respect your role and value your experience. Their goal is to partner with you - not take over. A trusting relationship is the foundation of this team.

At the start of each visit, the provider will check in with you. They'll ask about the child's progress since last visit - what you tried, what $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left($ worked well, what didn't, and what you'd like to focus on that day.





OBSERVATION

The provider will observe how the child participates in daily activities with you and the other children. Afterward, you'll talk together about what's going well and what could improve. Then, you'll brainstorm new strategies to try.








PRACTICE

You and the provider will practice these new strategies together. You'll discuss how they're working, whether any adjustments are needed, and how to make them a natural part of your routine.







DISCUSSION

Throughout the visit the provider will ask and answer your questions, and listen closely to your thoughts, ideas, and concerns. This open conversation helps you both figure out the best ways to support the child's learning and participation in activities.

At the end of the visit, you and the provider will make a plan for what you want to try between visits. You'll also pick a topic for the next time the provider comes. This is a great time to bring up any routines or activities that feel challenging, where you'd like extra support, or the best time to schedule the next visit.



AFTER THE VISIT

After the visit, the provider will follow up with the family based on their communication plan. You can also share updates with the family during pick-up or drop-off times to keep everyone on the same page.

Common Questions About Early Intervention in Childcare Settings

WHAT IS EARLY INTERVENTION (EI)?

Kentucky's Early Intervention (EI) helps babies and toddlers with delays or disabilities. Sometimes a child may be doing fine in some areas but still need help in others - delays aren't always easy to see. The goal is to support families and caregivers so children develop and take part in everyday life, focusing on:

- · Learning and problem-solving
- · Moving and getting around safely
- · Communicating

- · Playing and getting along with others
- · Doing daily tasks like eating or dressing
- · Understanding others

WHO PROVIDES EI SERVICES?

Early interventionists coach the people who are with the child every day. El providers may include:

- · Developmental interventionists
- Occupational therapists
- · Physical therapists
- · Speech therapists

WHERE DO EI SERVICES HAPPEN?

El happens during everyday routines, wherever children spend time:

- At home
- · In childcare centers or home daycares
- · With extended family
- In the community library, store, park, etc.

WHAT ARE TEACHER & PROVIDER ROLES?

El is a team effort! Teachers are a key part of that team. When El happens in childcare settings:

- Teachers act as a bridge between the provider and the family
- Providers wait for natural chances to talk or share ideas without interrupting class time
- Providers should not take the child out of the classroom for therapy, because the goal is for the child to receive support in their typical routines
- Teachers and providers build a trusting relationship by confirming each other's responsibilities and perspectives while partnering in the classroom

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS FOR TEACHERS?

Teachers get:

- Extra help and encouragement from another caring adult
- Guidance to help children with disabilities or delays join in activities with friends
- Strategies to use with all children in the classroom

HOW DO CHILDREN & FAMILIES BENEFIT?

It helps

- Children get help from people they know and trust
 Families feel more confident their child is learning.
- Families feel more confident their child is learning and developing
- Everyone become aware of the strengths and abilities of all children



ANYONE CAN REFER A CHILD FOR EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES
