

How To Do Laundry

Laundry Supply List:



- Laundry detergent
- Laundry stain remover (Optional)
- Fabric softener (Optional)
- Dryer sheets (Optional)
- Wrinkle Release (Optional)

Laundry Step By Step

1. Gather your laundry supplies.

2. Sort your laundry into loads.

- Blankets
- Sheets
- Towels
- Lights
- Darks
- Stained
- Jeans
- Reds & Pink
- As you are sorting check your tags for washing instructions so you don't shrink or discolor your clothes.



3. Pretreat any stains with laundry stain remover (optional).

4. Put a load in washer.

5. Follow the directions on the back of the laundry detergent. If you're using fabric softener, check the instructions on when and how to add it.



6. Set your washer to the correct cycle and start the washing machine.

7. Move your clean clothes to the dryer and set the temperature and the amount of time you want them to dry
(If using dryer sheets add them to the dryer when you add the wet clothing)

8. Set the temperature and the timer.
(If using dryer sheets, add them to the dryer when you add the wet clothing)

9. Once dried fold, hang and put away.
(Removing dried items right away you can greatly reduce wrinkles)

10. If your clothes are wrinkled, you can iron them or use spray-on wrinkle release.




Laundry Step By Step

Check List




- Gather laundry supplies
- All clothes are sorted by color, or material care instructions
- Pre-treat stains
- Fill the empty washer with a load of dirty clothes.
- Follow instructions on back of the detergent bottle .
- Follow the instructions on back of the laundry softener bottle (optional)
- Set washer according to instructions and wait for it to run its cycle
- Move clean clothes to the dryer.
- Check and empty lint trap before each load.
- Set heat and timer and wait until completely dry. (Sometimes it can require more time)
- Fold, hang and put away
- Iron or use wrinkle release spray (optional).

Washing Machine Cycles



Presoak- Soak stained and extra dirty clothes before starting a washing cycle.



Regular/Normal Wash - Longest cycle and most thorough. (Really soiled and cotton clothing)



Permanent Press - Helps to reduce wrinkles. (Nylon, polyester or acrylic materials)



Delicate - For handwash only clothing. (Silk and Wool)



Heavy duty - Is for more heavy materials. (Sheets, Blankets, Towels and jeans)



Bulky - This is for items that don't get washed everyday. (Small throw pillows, throw rugs, sheets, and blankets)



Rinse and Spin - Rinses the soap from clothing and then spins out the water.



Warm, hot and Cold - These are to chose which water temperature you want your clothes washed in.



Light and regular - Light = daily wear clothes that aren't very dirty. Regular = is for clothes a little more soiled.

Dryer Cycles



Permanent Press - Helps to reduce wrinkles. (Nylon, polyester or acrylic materials)



Bulky - This is for throw pillows, throw rugs, sheets, blankets, towels, and comforters.



Heavy Duty or Heavy - Is for more heavy materials. Uses a higher heat. (Robes, Comforters, and jeans)



Automatic or Auto Dry - Most used cycle for clothes and can be set for a certain amount of time to run.



Air Dry or Fluff - Used for heat-sensitive clothing or to refresh with a fabric softener sheet. Uses no heat.



Normal or Regular - Everyday use that is more heat regulated to help keep clothes from shrinking.



Delicate - For lace and knit fabrics or clothing like silk underwear, boxers and bras. Uses low heat.





Steam Cycle - To freshen clothing that are clean.


Washer Up Keep




**Clean the drum

prevent clogs.**








